There are many different communities in Canada. Each community is different. Some communities are in the northern parts, where it is cold. Other communities are along the ocean.

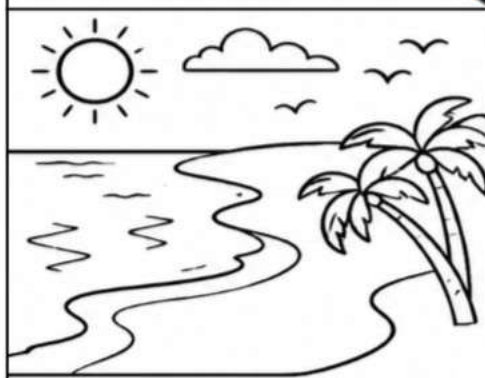
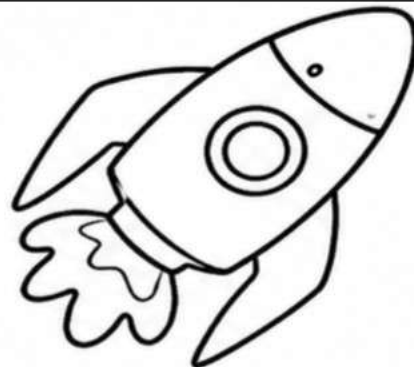
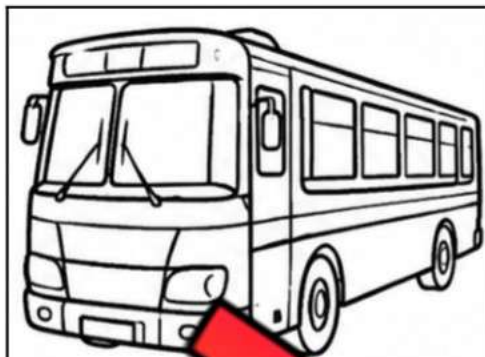
Communities still have many of the same things. Check out the things you will see in most communities in Canada.

- 5) Seasons: Four different times of the year with different weather.

- 7) Stores: Places to buy food, toys, clothes, and other things people need.
- 8) Homes: Places where families live, with rooms to sleep, eat and hang out.

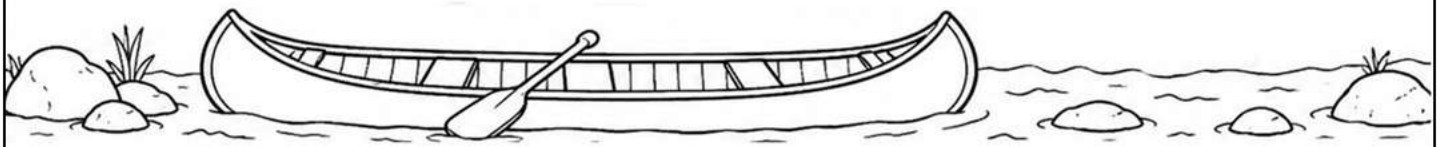


What Makes Them Special?

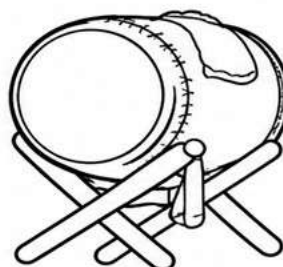
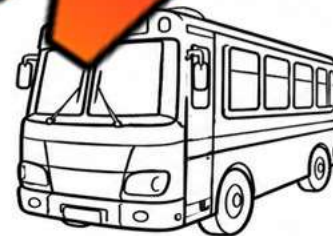
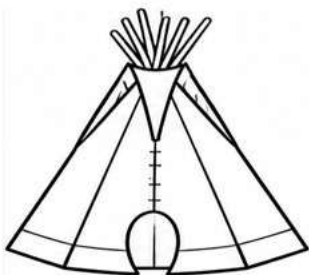

The Inuit, Metis, and First Nations

The Indigenous People of Canada

Inuit

The Inuit are a group of Indigenous people who live in the northern parts of Canada. They are known for:

- ☒ Expert hunting and fishing skills
- ☒ Living in the northern parts of Canada
- ☒ Using igloos to live in snow and ice
- ☒ Catching whales, seals, walrus, and caribou for food



First Nations

The First Nations are a group of Indigenous people who live in Canada. There are more than 630 First Nations communities in Canada. Each one has its own language, culture, and traditions.

Some First Nations people live on reserves. A reserve is an area of land set aside by the government for Indigenous peoples.

Métis

The Métis are a group of Indigenous people as well. Someone who is Métis will have one parent who is from a First Nation, and the other from a European country.



When Europeans first came to Canada, they were looking for beaver furs. Many men got close with the First Nations and Inuit because they needed help finding furs. This led to marriages between First Nation women and European men. When they had families, the kids were Métis.

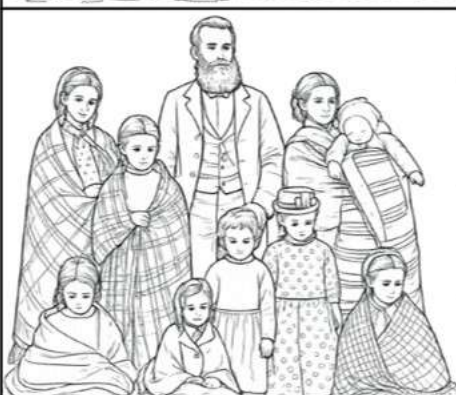

Inuit Seal Hunting in Nunavut

Where Inuit Families Live

Inuit families live in Nunavut, a big place in northern Canada. Nunavut has lots of ice, snow, and flat tundra. The ocean there is cold and covered with ice for most of the year. It is a very cold place to live, and people must wear special clothes.



How Inuit Hunt Seals

Inuit hunters hunt seals on the sea ice. They use a tool called a harpoon, which is long and sharp. They usually wait for seals to pop their heads out of holes in the ice to breathe. Inuit hunters are very patient and quiet when they wait.

Why Seals are Important

Seals are very important to Inuit families. Here are three reasons why:

- **Food:** Inuit eat seal meat because it is healthy and helps them stay strong in the cold.
- **Clothing:** Inuit use seal skin and fur to make warm boots, jackets, and mittens.
- **Light and Heat:** Long ago, Inuit used seal oil in lamps to light their homes and keep warm.



Respect for Nature

Hunting seals helps Inuit children learn to respect animals and nature. Inuit only hunt what they need and thank the seals for giving them food and clothes.

How Métis Hunted Buffalo

Getting Ready for the Hunts

Long ago, Métis families hunted buffalo on the big, open prairies of Canada. These hunts happened two times every year, once in the summer and once in the fall. Hundreds of hunters joined together for each hunt. They brought fast, strong horses to chase buffalo. Before each hunt, families packed food, clothing, and important tools. Everyone was on horseback and had to be very careful because hunting buffalo was dangerous.



When hunters found a buffalo, the chase began! Hunters rode their horses very fast, with the wind. Buffalo could run as fast as a horse. Hunters worked as a team to keep the buffalo running together in one direction. They shouted and urged the buffalo moving toward the hunters waiting. Then they used tools like rifles or spears to kill the buffalo.

After the Hunt

After the chase ended, everyone worked together. They prepared the buffalo meat to eat later. Buffalo hides were used to make clothes, blankets, and tipis. Bones and horns became tools. No part of the buffalo was wasted. Métis families shared what they got from the hunt. These hunts were important for the Métis way of life.

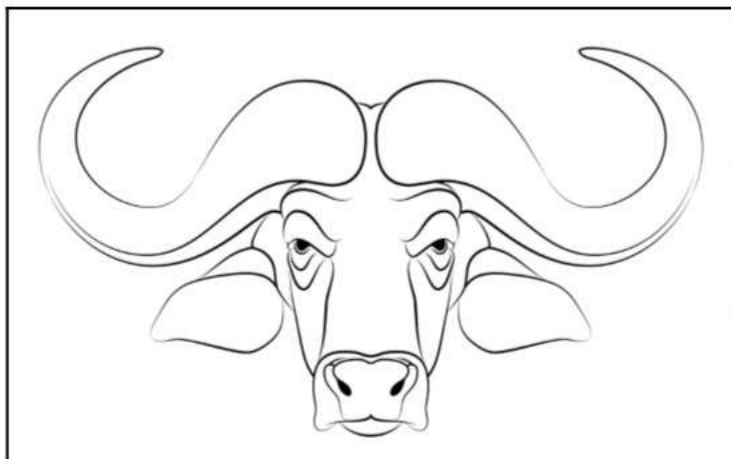

How First Nations Used Cedar Trees

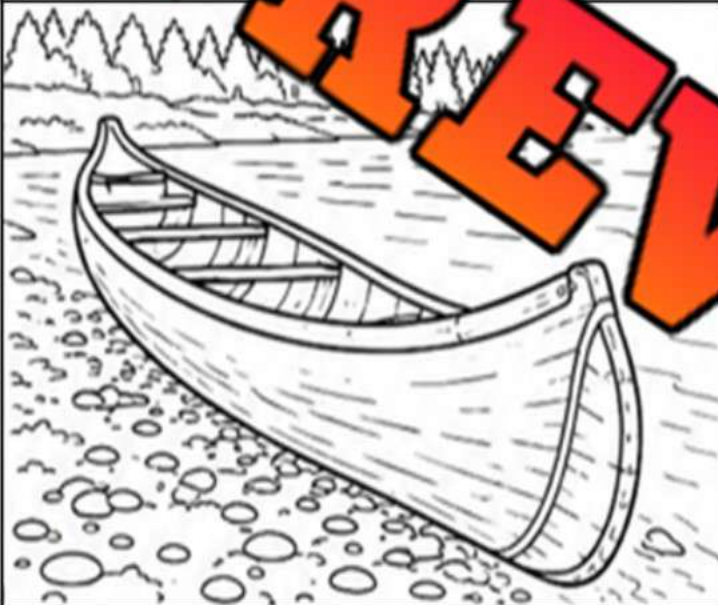
The Cedar Tree of the West Coast

Many First Nations people on the West Coast of Canada lived near large forests filled with cedar trees. Cedar trees were very important because they provided many things families needed in daily life. People called cedar the "Tree of Life" because most every part of the tree could be used.

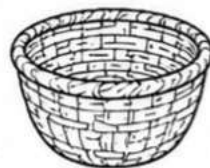


What Cedar Was Used For

First Nations people used cedar wood to build strong canoes for traveling on rivers and the ocean. They also used cedar to build longhouses where families lived together. The soft inner bark of the cedar could be woven into baskets, hats, and clothing. People carved cedar wood to create beautiful totem poles that shared stories.

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Haida First Nation

Who Are The Haida First Nation?

The Haida First Nation are Indigenous people living in British Columbia and Alaska, mainly on the Gwaii islands.



Worldview

The Haida believe everything is connected, and all living things are part of the same family. They value caring for each other and the land.

Protocols

The Haida have special rules for respect and behavior during events and ceremonies. Examples include:

- 1) Respect for Elders: Elders hold knowledge and wisdom, and younger members learn from them.
- 2) Feasting and Food Sharing: Food sharing is important in Haida culture, with elders and guests served first at gatherings.
- 3) Clan System: Haida have two main clans, Eagles and Ravens. People marry between clans to maintain close ties.

Activity – Making A Haida Canoe

Objective

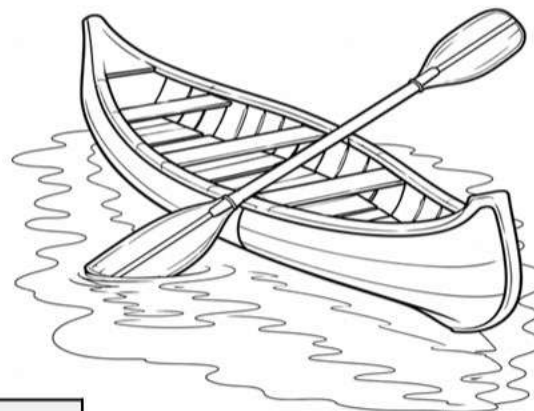
What are we learning more about?

Students will learn about what Haida canoes looked like and the artwork that is done on the canoe.

Materials

What do we need?

- ✓ Cardstock or thick paper
- ✓ Scissors
- ✓ Markers, coloured pencils or crayons
- ✓ Glue or tape
- ✓ Haida canoe template

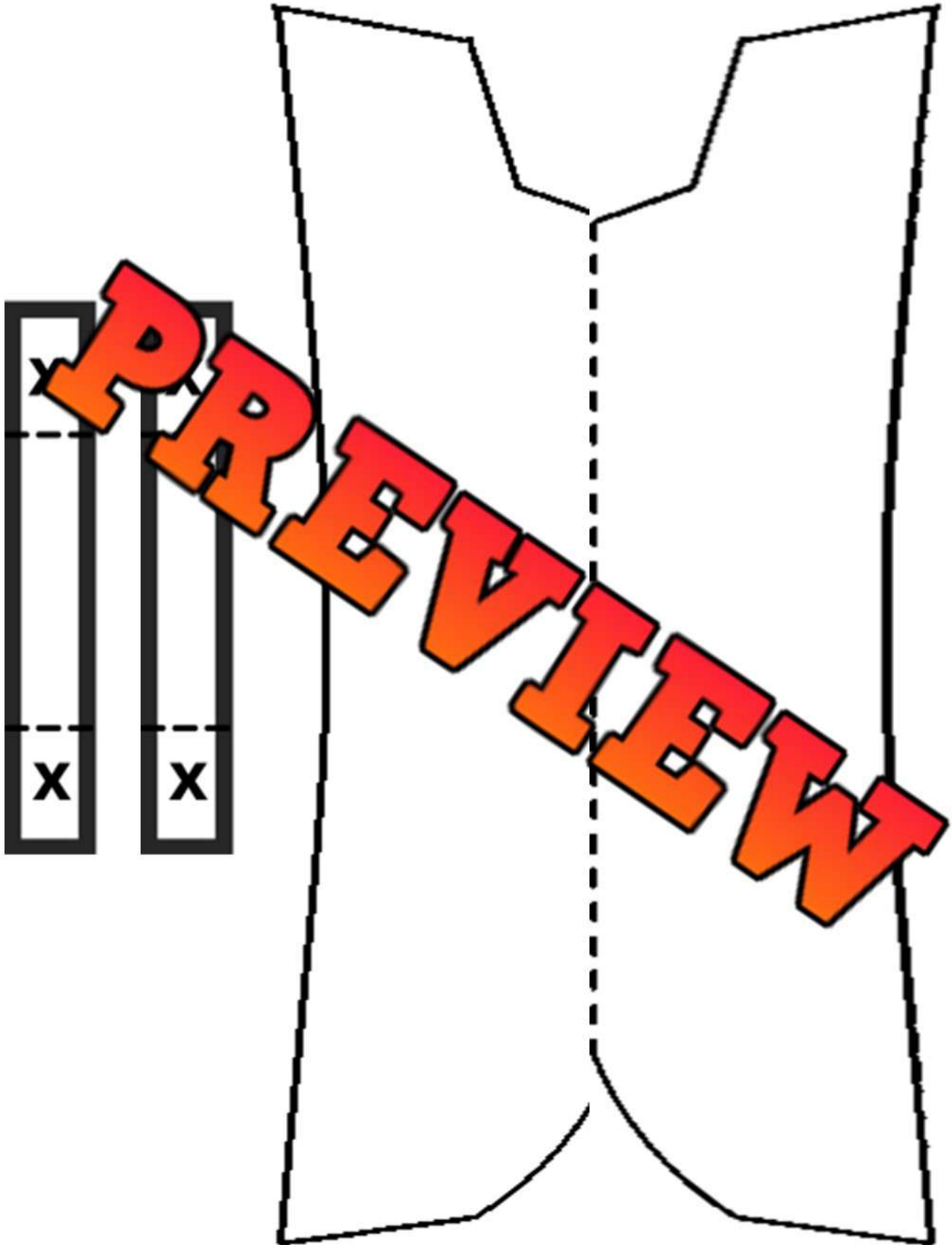


Method

How do we make the canoe?

- 1) Print the template on thick paper or cardstock.
- 2) Have the students colour the canoe (both sides). Encourage them to look at Haida art and designs for inspiration, but also let them use their own ideas.
- 3) Instruct the students to carefully cut out the canoe template along the lines.
- 4) Have the students fold the paper along the folding line, creating the shape of the canoe.
- 5) Paste or tape the bottom edges of the canoe together (do not paste the top of the canoe together). This should allow the canoe to hold its shape.
- 6) Cut the seats out (two rectangular pieces). They should be coloured brown.
- 7) Use tape or glue to secure the seats to both sides of the inside of the canoe. The seats will help hold the canoe together.
- 8) Let the canoe dry before displaying it.

Haida Ceremony - Potlatch

What is the Haida Potlatch Ceremony?

The Haida Potlatch is a special event for the Haida people. It's like a big party where friends and family gather to celebrate important moments. Here's what happens during a Haida Potlatch:



Sharing	Lots of food is brought to share with everyone. Elders and special guests are served first.
Giving Gifts:	The host gives gifts to the guests, like blankets or food, as a way to say thank you and share.
Telling Stories:	Haida people tell stories about their history, ancestors, and traditions. Everyone is encouraged to learn.
Dancing and Singing:	Music and dance are an important part. Haida people perform special dances and songs with traditional costumes and masks.
Celebrating Events:	A Potlatch can be for different occasions like naming a baby, remembering someone, or celebrating a marriage.

Totem Poles: Tall Stories From BC

What Are Totem Poles?

Totem poles are tall, carved wooden poles made by the Haida people and other Indigenous groups from the Pacific Northwest Coast. They have special designs with animals, people, and magical creatures.

What Do They Mean?

Each pole tells a story or shows a family's history, ancestors, and important events. The figures on the pole are symbols that stand for family signs, legends, or beliefs. When the figures are put together can tell a specific story or message.



How Are They Made?

- 1) Picking a Tree: A good tree, usually a Western red cedar, is picked for its size and quality. The tree is then cut down.
- 2) Design and Plan: The person carving the pole makes a design in consultation with the family or group. The design is then drawn on the pole as it is cut.
- 3) Carving: The person carving uses traditional tools, like adzes, chisels, and knives, to carve the figures into the wood.
- 4) Painting: After the carving is done, the totem pole is painted using natural colours made from plants.
- 5) Putting Up the Pole: At the end, the finished totem pole is put up in a special event with food, singing, and dancing. The pole must be dug into the ground so it is secure.

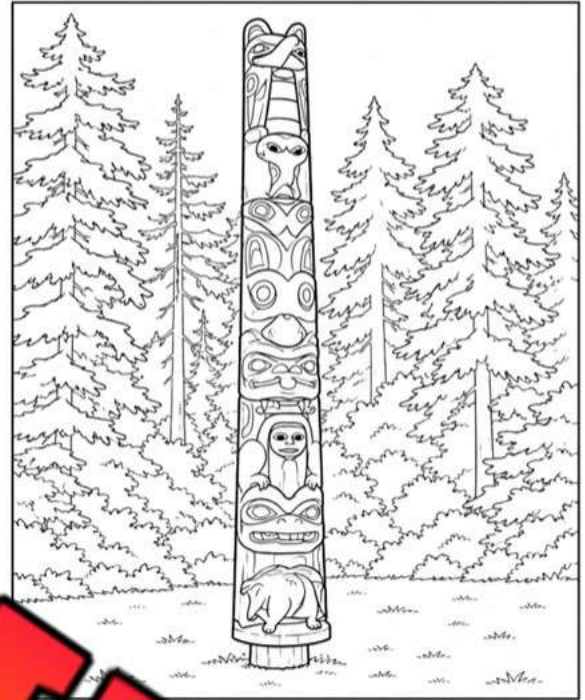

- 5) Draw your own totem pole in the space provided using symbols that represent you.
- 6) Add details and colour your drawing.
- 7) Be ready to share what your totem pole represents.

The Haida community use totem poles to tell stories of their history. Each symbol represents a story or important part of their culture (dances or songs). These poles are made from tall cedar trees that are carved and painted using bright colours.

7:00am	I ate breakfast - salmon, berries, and seaweed.
7:30am - 8:00am	After breakfast, I did a couple chores. I found some firewood and then carried water to my house from a nearby stream.
8:00am - 12:00pm	I spent the morning learning from elders and doing activities like weaving, carving, and fishing. I also heard many stories about family and culture.
12:00pm - 1:00pm	I had lunch with my family. We had a meal made from things found nearby - salmon, berries, and corn.
1:00pm - 5:00pm	In the afternoon, I played games with my friends. We raced, did archery, and played many other games.
5:00pm - 6:00pm	I helped my family get dinner ready. I cleaned up and found some fish. I also found some fresh berries.

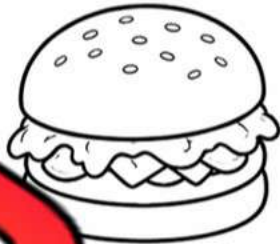

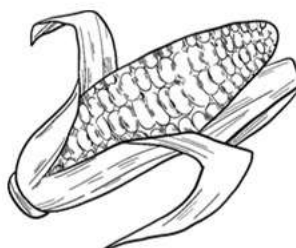
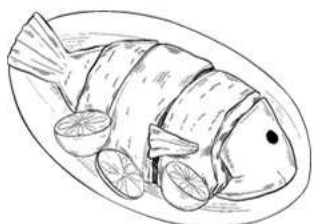

The arctic may be cold, but it still has lots of natural resources. Check them out below. The Inuit use these natural resources to survive.

1) Animals

Inuit people use animals for food, clothing, and other things. Some of the animals that are hunted and fished in Inuit communities include:

- Caribou and moose: Meat is eaten. The hides are used for clothing. The antlers are used for tools.
- Arctic char: A fish that is eaten.



2) Plants

There are not many plants that can grow in the arctic climate. The ones that do grow are used a lot.

- Arctic cotton: A type of plant that is used for padding and insulation.
- Labrador tea: A plant that can be used to treat coughs and colds.

3) Minerals

Inuit communities are also rich in minerals. Some of the minerals found in the arctic include:

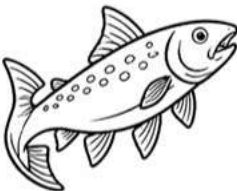
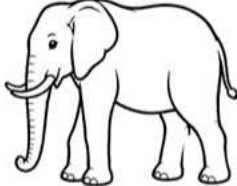
- Iron: This mineral is used to make tools and weapons.

Why Immigrate to Canada?

Canada is a big country with lots of land and **natural resources**. It has lots of fresh water, fish, animals and trees. Canada is a good place to live because we have everything we need.

Early **explorers** from Iceland, France, and England were the first immigrants to Canada. The first settlers traded with the indigenous people for furs which were sent back to Europe.

Acadian Community

The Acadians are a group of people who came from France to Acadia. Acadia was a French colony that was found in the provinces we now call Nova Scotia, PEI, and New Brunswick.

Why Did They Move to Acadia?

People living in France took a very long boat ride across the Atlantic Ocean to move to Acadia. They took this ride for several reasons:

- Good land for farming: Acadia had fertile soil, which was perfect for growing crops.
- Lots of fish in the sea: The Atlantic Ocean was full of fish, and the settlers could make a living by fishing.
- Beautiful forests: The forests in Acadia were full of trees and animals, which the settlers could use for building houses and finding food.
- Freedom to practice their religion: In France, some people were not allowed to practice their religion, but in Acadia they could do so freely.
- Community: The French settlers loved that they could keep their own French culture in a land full of opportunity.

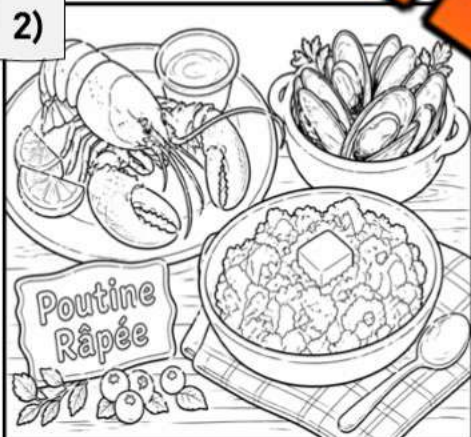

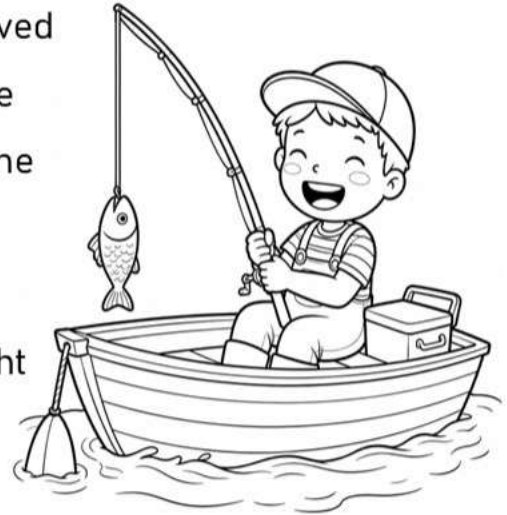

Materials What you will need for the activity

- ☐ 10-15 small rocks or stones
- ☐ A designated playing area: a clear, flat surface
- ☐ Measuring tape or ruler (optional)
- ☐ Marker or chalk (optional)
- ☐ Pylons (optional)



Method

How you will complete the activity

- 1) Playing Area: Choose a clear, flat surface such as a lawn. You will need something to aim for when throwing the rock. You can choose a tree, a natural feature, or place a pylon on the ground.
- 2) Making Teams: Depending on the number of students, divide the students into teams of two or three. Each team should have an equal number of rocks or stones to use.
- 3) Tossing the Rocks: Each player on the team takes a turn tossing a rock towards the target. The rock should be tossed underhanded, with the palm of the hand facing down.
- 4) Score Points: After one person from each team throws their rock, check to see who was the closest. That team will get 1 point.
- 5) Continue Playing: Teams continue to take turns tossing the rocks until all players have had a chance to throw. The team with the most points at the end of the game is declared the winner.

What is a Religious Family?

A **religious family** is a family that practices a **religion**. A religious family might go to church regularly, wear different clothes, celebrate different traditions, or participate in religious culture (dance, art, and music). Many religious families will pray at different times throughout the day.



Jewish Families

A Jewish family practices the religion of **Judaism**. They may do things differently than you. For example, instead of **Christmas**, a Jewish family will celebrate **Hanukkah**. Hanukkah is a Jewish holiday that lasts 8 nights. Throughout the 8 days, a **menorah** with 8 candles is used. Each night, as a family lights the candles, they sing blessings. Sustainability

What is Sustainability?

Sustainability means using **natural resources** in a way that keeps them safe for the future. If people waste resources, they may run out. People need to take care of **water, soil, trees, and animals** so they do not disappear.

Saving Water

Some places do not have much **fresh water**. If people use too much, there will not be enough for drinking or animals. People can save water by:

- Turning off faucets when using water
- Collecting rain water for plants
- Fixing leaks so no water is wasted



Protecting the Soil

Farmers need **healthy soil** to grow food. If they do not take care of it, the soil can become **dry** and stop growing food. Farmers protect soil by:

- Rotating crops so the soil does not get too tired
- Using **natural fertilizers** like compost
- Planting trees to stop soil from washing away

Taking Care of Animals

If people **overhunt or overfish**, animals can disappear. This can hurt people who need these animals for food. To protect animals, people can:

- Only catch what they need
- Follow **hunting and fishing rules**
- Protect places where animals live



When people take care of **nature**, it stays **safe** for many years.
